It's the 'return of the king'; the person who left the UK behind, who is allowed to come home and be paraded around like a royal visiting a country. They aim to see as many people as quickly as possible, so that they can visit somewhere else with the holiday days they've managed to save as a result

THEIR RELATIONSHIP WITH THE UK

It's their home, and it will always be their home. The main draw of the UK is the people. **Reluctant Returners** can go anywhere, seemingly whenever they want. So when they think of the UK, they think about the people that they left behind. No other country has that to offer them.





They spend on average 9.8 days in the UK, and spend roughly £1000 on a trip, meaning they are spending £102.04 a day without a hotel. If we convince just 1% of people like Reluctant Returners to spend just 4 extra days in the UK, this could equate to £408,160 in spend, which is likely to be higher if we turn this stay into a leisure break, with a hotel.
