- Delve beneath the surface on a tour of the Victoria Tunnel, head to Gateshead Sage Centre for eclectic music and theatre, or explore creative Ouseburn, Newcastle's thriving culture and food quarter.
- Cycle to the Angel of the North in Gateshead, Britain's biggest sculpture, or kayak beneath Newcastle's famous bridges.
- Relive 19th- and 20th-century life at Beamish, The Living Museum of the North, or use the city as a base for exploring UNESCO World Heritage Site, Hadrian's Wall.





Fun Fact

The city's High Level Bridge was the world's first to combine road and rail, while the Millennium Bridge was the first of its kind to pivot sideways to allow boats through.

Did you know?

Newcastle was once home to an ancient fort. Pons Aelius, or Newcastle Roman Fort, was a Roman settlement on the fringes of Hadrian's Wall, with the area now home to medieval Newcastle Castle.



Getting around

Newcastle Gateshead can be discovered via an extensive public transport system or on foot, with bike hire also available for those keen to explore on two wheels.

By train



An award-winning Tyne and Wear metro system has 60 stations around Newcastle, Gateshead, Sunderland, North Tyneside and South Tyneside. Airport connections take just 23 minutes.

By bus



Bus travel is a convenient way of getting around Newcastle and Gateshead, and everywhere in the region is accessible with Go North East.

By bike



Hop on a bike and explore Newcastle Gateshead and beyond from Quayside, with plenty of safe and scenic routes in the Northumberland countryside, too.

Getting to Newcastle-Gateshead

Located in north-east of England

- Newcastle International Airport is around 12km from the city and serves more than 80 destinations around the world.
- Direct flights are available from London Heathrow and London Stansted airports to Newcastle International Airport. The flight takes around 1 hour.
- A ferry service from DFDS connects Newcastle Gateshead to Amsterdam in the Netherlands.
- Trains from London Kings Cross to Newcastle Gateshead take around 3 hours. Other popular train routes run from Leeds, York and Manchester.
