Places to stay in Bath



Central Bath

Most of the historical and cultural gems can be found in the centre of Bath. The oldest part of the city boasts handsome Georgian architecture, and it is the only place in Britain where visitors can bathe in natural thermal hot springs.

Walcot

Walcot is a vibrant, bohemian district north of the city centre, known for its eclectic mix of independent shops, artisan markets, cosy cafes and a lively arts scene.

Victoria Park

Victoria Park is a leafy neighbourhood centred around the expansive Royal Victoria Park, perfect for relaxing strolls, picnics and family-friendly activities, with nearby attractions like the Botanical Gardens and the Royal Crescent.

Getting around

Bath's coach, bus and railway stations are located in the heart of the city. The city centre is compact and best explored on foot.

By bus



Bath's public bus service is well connected throughout the city and beyond. [First West Bus](#) is the largest operator. Why not try a 'hop on, hop off' city [sightseeing bus tour](#).

By train



The city's major railway station is Bath Spa in the city centre.

By bike



With several self-service hire stations around the city, traffic-free cycle routes and the Bristol to Bath Cycle Path, this scenic city is easy to [explore by bike](#).

Getting to Bath


Located in south-west England

 The closest airport is **Bristol Airport**. The **A4 Air Decker** bus offers a direct service from the airport to Bath, taking around **45 minutes**.

 There are direct flights from **Birmingham International** to Bristol (**1 hour**).

 **First Bus** is the largest bus operator connecting Bath to Bristol and the West. There is a coach service from London Heathrow to Bath with **National Express** taking just over **two hours**.

 **Great Western Railway (GWR)** operates regular services from London Paddington to Bath Spa train station taking around **80 minutes**.
