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England's 2025 highlights

- **Bradford: UK City of Culture 2025** – All eyes are on Bradford this year, as it takes the helm as **UK City of Culture 2025** – endorsed by leading creatives such as artist **David Hockney**, magician **Dynamo** and singer **Zayn Malik**. Bradford will host more than 1,000 new performances by local, national and international creatives including 365 artworks, as well as festivals and live music shows – many of which will be free. Also this year, the city's new dining hub **Darley Street Market** will open its doors, while music venue **Bradford Live** and the **Bradford National Science and Media Museum** will unveil fresh renovations. And keep an eye out for the new biopic TV series **Gandhi**, which was filmed in Bradford.
- **200th anniversary of the modern railway, nationwide** – 200 years ago on 27 September 1825, the world's first steam-powered passenger train travelled on the Stockton and Darlington Railway: the birth of modern rail travel. The anniversary will be celebrated with **Railway 200** festivities all over England this year, including the **New Year's Day Whistle** (1 January), York's National Railway Museum reopening its **Station Hall** (September), Stockton and Darlington Railway's **S&DR200 festival** (March – November) and new exhibition **Fuelling the Railway Revolution** in County Durham (from June). Meanwhile, this summer the **Britannic Explorer, A Belmond Train** will become England's first luxury sleeper hotel traversing London, Cornwall and the Lake District with fine dining, spa treatments and spectacular views.
- **Jane Austen's 250th birthday, nationwide** – Happy birthday, Jane Austen! The great author was born in Hampshire on 16 December 1775, and what better excuse to revisit her era-defining novels – and the places that inspired them? In Bath, don your bonnet for three **Austen-themed gala balls** complete with Regency dance lessons (May, June and December) – while **Jane Austen's House** in Hampshire will host festivals, pop up talks and writing workshops year-round. There will be Austen exhibitions at Bath's **No.1 Royal Crescent** (July – November), Winchester's **Gallery in The Arc** (July – November); Southampton's **SeaCity Museum** (March - October), and the **Dorset Museum** in Dorchester (June-September), which showcases Jane Austen: Down to the Sea exploring Austen's lifelong relationship with the coast and maritime life which shaped her novels. For the first time ever, her **schoolroom in Reading** will open to visitors (April – October), as will **No. 8 College Street** in Winchester (June – August), where she spent the final few weeks of her life. With the new four-part BBC drama **Miss Austen** released in February 2025, this anniversary is a great opportunity to explore England's many famous literary and filming locations associated with the renowned author's work.
- **Women's Rugby World Cup 2025, nationwide** – Come on, Red Roses! The world's elite women's rugby teams will go head-to-head at the **Women's Rugby World Cup 2025**, at arenas all over England (August and September). Games will take place in **Brighton and Hove, Bristol, Exeter, London, Manchester, Northampton, Sunderland** and **York** – giving fans the chance to see top teams in action.
- **Top new hotels** – From shepherds' huts to city havens, a vast range of new hotels will open across England this year. In the capital, look out for the deluxe **Six Senses London** (late 2025), **Dorsett Canary Wharf** (spring) and **The Newman** (summer) – while in June, **The Chancery Rosewood** will bring five-star flair to the former US Embassy in Mayfair. Elsewhere, other hot properties include **Treehouse Hotel Manchester** (spring 2025) and Northumberland's **Bailiffgate Hotel** in Alnwick (June), and new outposts for **THE PIG in Stratford-upon-Avon** (spring) and **Hotel Gotham in Newcastle** (June 2025). - **Fresh wellness experiences** – England has a wealth of new ways to put a spring in your step: **Tudor Farmhouse Hotel** in the Forest of Dean will debut new journaling and mindfulness retreats (June), Tofte Manor's **Wellbeing Escapes** in Bedfordshire will offer seasonal eating and sound baths (March) and the Isles of Scilly will host Tresco's inaugural **Festival of Wellness** (March) with yoga and Qi Gong. Hop on the hot sauna trend at Lancashire's **Hidden Hills Glamping**, whose cabins will all feature private saunas (January) or splash out on the two-storey hydrotherapy suite at Mayfair's **Cambridge House** (winter).

Trends

All-star anniversaries

It's set to be a bumper year for birthday parties. Not only is this the **250th anniversary of Jane Austen's birth**, and the **200th year of the modern British railway**, but London-born artist **J.M.W. Turner** will turn 250 in April with celebrations including Margate's **Turner Contemporary** gallery displaying the Turner painting *Margate Beach* from February 2025. In the capital, the **Greenwich Royal Observatory** will mark its 350th year, honoured by the launch of a three-year regeneration programme which will include new galleries, refurbishments and accessibility improvements and the **London Eye** will turn a comparatively youthful 25 years old in the spring. The **New Forest** will celebrate its 20th year as a national park – while **UNESCO**, the UN's cultural conservation organisation which was founded in London, will blow out 80 candles on its cake. To celebrate, why not visit one of England's 19 UNESCO-listed treasures, such as Stonehenge, the Lake District or Derby's Derwent Valley? Other anniversaries are more poignant, such as **80 years since VE Day** – which marked the end of WW2 in Europe on 8 May 1945 – and 85 years since the daring **Operation Dynamo** rescued Allied troops at Dunkirk. It is also 60 years since the death of **Sir Winston Churchill**, the former Prime Minister who led Britain to victory in WW2. And finally, a very happy wedding anniversary to **King Charles III and Queen Camilla**, who are celebrating their platinum year: believe it or not, it has been two decades since they wed at Windsor's Guildhall.

Noctourism: a new after-dark travel trend

When the sun goes down, "noctourism" begins – a new holiday trend for 2025, says Booking.com in its **annual travel forecast**. After-dark nature adventures will be more popular than ever this year, predicts the hotel booking platform – and England's new nightlife is certainly looking star-studded. In the south west, **Exmoor's Dark Skies Festival** (17 October – 2 November) will feature twilight yoga and astronomy suppers, while in the Lake District, the **Cumbria Dark Skies Festival** (autumn) offers starlit adventures including canoeing and bushcraft workshops. In Lancashire, you can look skywards from the hot tubs at **Hidden Hills Glamping** (opening in January), while **Beamish** in County Durham and **Chester Zoo** in Cheshire will be launching accommodation – your chance to bed down in a Georgian-style cottage or a cabin overlooking the snoozing giraffes. And what better excuse to revisit some of England's other night-time adventures? It's worth staying up for **moonlit kayaking** across **Dorset's Studland Bay** and the **River Tyne** in Newcastle; **nighttime rockpool safaris** in **Cornwall**; or **stargazing swims** in the **Lake District**.

Amazing days out – for free

Leave your wallet at home, because England is bursting with free events and festivals. Most tickets for **Bradford's UK City of Culture 2025** theatre performances, art shows and live music won't cost a penny (year-round), and nor will many celebrations for **Railway 200** – including Stockton and Darlington Railway's **S&DR200 festival** (March – November) and the new-look Power Hall at Manchester's **Science and Industry Museum** (summer). Explore the **Lake District** and **Yorkshire** on the freshly designated **Coast to Coast National Trail** (late 2025) meaning improved accessibility and higher maintenance/environmental standards, while wheelchair users in **Nidderdale**, **York** and **Selby** will be able to access **free accessibility info packs** for action-packed days out. Meanwhile, the **V&A East Storehouse** in London (May) will be gratis for all – as will the colourful summertime sculpture trails around **Hull**, **Bristol** and **Gloucestershire**.

Get up-close with legends

Autograph books at the ready! A stellar crop of A-list actors, musicians and sports teams will be heading to England this year – bringing star quality to our theatres, galleries and arenas. This summer, **Kylie**, **Oasis**, **Coldplay**, **Beyonce**, **Robbie Williams** and the **Scissor Sisters** will be headlining concerts all over the nation. Fans of legendary performance artist **Marina Abramović** can catch her premiere of **Balkan Erotic Epic** in Manchester (autumn), while another cultural must-see is the inaugural **SXSW London** festival (June), featuring top creative talents and speakers from across the globe. And prepare for sporting history with the arrival of the **Women's Rugby World Cup 2025** in August, which will see the world's top teams playing fixtures nationwide – in the likes of **Bristol**, **Exeter**, **Sunderland** and **York**.

England starring on screen

Calling all film buffs and TV lovers: England's landscapes and landmarks take a starring role for 2025. The trend of 'set-jetting' – visiting the places that star in your favourite shows and movies – will gather momentum this year, predicts [Expedia's 2025 travel forecast](#), thanks to the bumper crop of new releases hitting our screens. Maybe [The Salt Path](#) (May) – based on Raynor Winn's best-selling novel – will inspire you to hike the South West Coast Path. Or perhaps you'll track Tom Cruise to the Lake District, where he shot daredevil stunts for [Mission: Impossible – Dead Reckoning Part II](#) (May)? Birmingham and Liverpool set the scene for the hot new [Peaky Blinders](#) film, while Netflix's adaptation of [The Thursday Murder Club](#) was shot in Buckinghamshire and Berkshire (both release dates TBC). And in February, the *Bridget Jones* films reached their finale with [Mad About the Boy](#) – a love letter to London, as its haphazard heroine returns to her roots. Also this year, Greenwich's [Old Royal Naval College](#) celebrates 100 years as a film location: to mark the occasion, it will offer special themed tours (TBC).

Bites for all budgets

England's thriving dining scene continues to inspire travellers, with VisitEngland's Domestic Sentiment Tracker revealing that that close to a third (32%) of UK holidaymakers say a top holiday activity in early 2025 will be trying local food and drink. And we have a huge range of new foodie openings this year: from fresh street food markets in [Bristol](#), Birmingham ([Society Birmingham](#) and [BOXPARK](#)), London's [St Paul's](#) and [Derby](#), to the launch of [Gordon Ramsay's latest restaurants](#) at London's 22 Bishopsgate – Europe's highest new dining spot (February). In Manchester, members can enjoy fine dining at the new [Soho House](#) (early 2025), or feast on street bites in [STACK](#)'s trendy market (spring). Elsewhere in the north, Hairy Biker Si King will launch new takeaway restaurant [PROPA!](#) in Sunderland and Bradford's [Darley Street Market](#) (spring) will open its doors during the city's reign as Capital of Culture. Whilst in Kent, wine lovers can savour the first ever sip of [Domaine & Evremond](#) vineyard's sparkling vintage and experience its new winery and visitor centre and in the West Midlands, [Judith's](#) in Stratford-upon-Avon will host new rum tastings from February. For something a little different, go [calvados tasting at The Angel Inn](#), Suffolk (April), or toast a fruity kir royale on an e-bike tour of [White Heron Estate](#) – a family-run Herefordshire cassis farm (April).

Going green for good

It's never been easier to embrace responsible travel in England – the nation is full of new low-carbon, low-impact ways to explore. What's more, nearly a third (32%) of UK holidaymakers say their top activity for this spring will be 'walking, hiking, rambling' so it's a great time to join the [20th Malvern Walking Festival](#) for guided hikes and nature trails (May – June), explore the Lake District and Yorkshire on the newly designated [Coast to Coast National Trail](#) (late 2025) or spot [Wallace and Gromit](#) on Bristol's new art trail (June). Alternatively, leave the car at home and take the train instead – it's the year of [Railway 200](#), after all – to discover pioneering sustainable fashions at [Kew Gardens' Material World](#) exhibition (September – October) or the [community-boosting](#) art and theatre projects of [Bradford's UK City of Culture 2025](#) celebrations (year-round). [Bristol](#) will also mark 10 years since it became the first UK city to be awarded European Green Capital status, so now's the time to leap into its vegan dining scene, vintage emporiums and trailblazing [hydrogen-powered cruises](#). Lots of new hotels are going green too, from [Zeal Hotel Exeter](#)'s energy-saving smarts (January) and the 25-mile menu at [THE PIG-on the Farm](#) in Stratford-upon-Avon (autumn), to exclusive discounts for guests who use public transport to reach Hertfordshire's [Bethnal&Bec Luxury Stays](#) (spring).

A new look for landmarks

Some of England's best-loved landmarks are getting a glow-up – with new renovations being unveiled at York's [National Railway Museum](#) (September) and Leicester's [Jewry Wall Museum](#) (summer). In East Anglia, named in Lonely Planet's 'Best in Travel 2025' hotlist, [Norwich Castle](#) will reveal a sparkling new gallery and viewing area (spring), while visitors to London will have the chance to stay in Trafalgar Square's iconic Admiralty Arch for the first time, with the opening of [England's first Waldorf Astoria hotel](#). This summer, Manchester's [Science and Industry Museum](#) will celebrate all-things steam-powered with the launch of its multi-million-pound [Power Hall](#) – set to be one of the city's hottest tickets – while the £40m transformation of Hull's [Maritime City](#) will gather pace with two new attractions (spring and autumn). In London, look out for fresh outposts of legendary arts institutions, too: [Sadler's Wells East](#) theatre debuted in Stratford in February, with the [V&A East Storehouse](#) museum opening in May. And just as Bradford is crowned UK City of Culture 2025, its live music venue [Bradford Live](#) and cultural hotspot [Bradford National Science and Media Museum](#) will unveil their state-of-the-art renovations.

After a multi-year transformation, Manchester's 19th Century Town Hall will reopen next July – one of England's most significant heritage projects in the pipeline. Visitors will be able to join guided tours of previously off-limits areas, such as the Victorian police cells, courtyard and clocktower, and see the original mosaic floors from the 1870s which feature the city's famous bee emblem. Highlights of the Town Hall's art and cultural collection will also be displayed in a visitor centre, telling Manchester's story through an eclectic array of interactive exhibitions.

Winter 2026

The Year of the Normans, Nationwide

2027

The year 2027 marks 1,000 years since the birth of William the Conqueror, with UK wide cultural programmes celebrating the Norman legacy in England.
